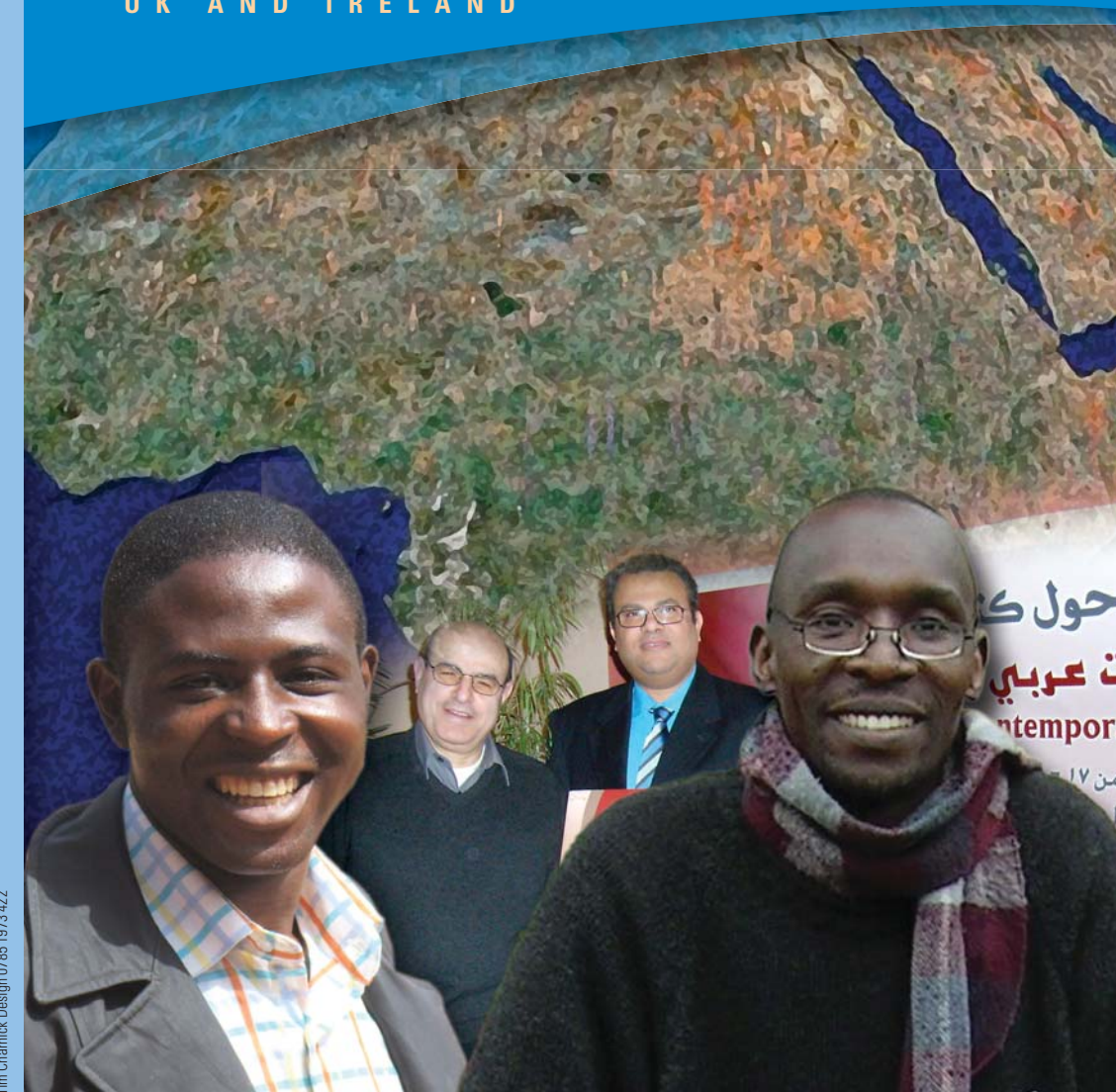

"Now I know your secret!"

Chris Wright tells of his recent trip to Nigeria.

Safia who attends Pastor James' church in Abuja, could not understand what had happened to him. But during 2007 something changed. "I found he was different," she told me as I led the second Nigerian Langham Preaching seminar. "He used to preach all over the place, but now

he never uses illustrations or stories that are not relevant to the text he is preaching from. And he always ties his conclusion to what the text is saying."

Mrs Safia Nana Zakana was attending the seminar at Level 1 which Pastor James had attended last year, and clearly it had changed him. "So when I see him," Safia laughed, "I'm going to tell him, 'Now I know your secret!' Already we are asking him to train us and others in the church in what he has learned."

Safia herself was a TV presenter before, so she never had any problem about standing up and speaking before audiences. Her problem was knowing how to handle the Bible well and how to teach it properly to others. She works for RURCON – 'Rural Church Councillors of Nigeria' – a teaching and training network that encourages rural

church pastors to have a holistic ministry of the gospel in words and works. So she has lots of opportunities to teach and train others. "I wanted to know how to present the Word of God properly in context – its own context, and our context – so that people can understand it and be changed," she said. "This seminar is helping me to do exactly that."

The Nigerian movement grows fast

The Langham Preaching movement in Nigeria started in February 2007 with 150 people at Level 1. This year, 90 of them returned for Level 2 training, while another 160 joined at a fresh Level 1. It is likely the movement will have to split into several regional streams as it continues to grow. It is supported by several heads of denominations that number millions of members, some of whom attended throughout, at the invitation of Gideon Para-Malam, the main organiser.

Langham Literature provided books for the participants, and some more were provided as gifts and for sale through Africa Christian Textbooks. Many bought copies of the Africa Bible Commentary.

And Langham Scholars are involved as well. The chair of the Nigerian Langham

Preaching committee is Rev Dr Pandang Yamsat, who is the President of the Church of Christ in Nigeria (COCIN). And another Langham Scholar, Bishop Cyril Okorochoa sent ten pastors from his Diocese of Owerri, and gave a guest lecture one evening.

Making a difference

I was keen to hear from the first group if what they learned last year had made any difference to their preaching habits and their church's life. I got some encouraging responses.

Pastor Bitrus Abba pastors a church in the Hausa speaking Kagoro region. "I used to feel so guilty before," he said, "because I never prepared properly. I would just do a bit on Saturday night or even Sunday morning before preaching.

So last year's seminar made me sit up.

Now, I start every Monday morning to study and prepare. Then I do a little bit each evening and put it all together on Friday night. There has been a much better response from my people. Their level of

interest is greater because they can see clearly the main message and purpose of each passage. Many more are coming to the mid-week prayer meeting and Bible study. I have just bought the Africa Bible Commentary, which will be really helpful. I find I learn so much as I prepare.

"During the past year we also started a Preachers Club for our town, and that has met twice, and we will go on meeting and learning together."

Exploding but dissatisfied.

Pastor Caleb Mutfwang leads a large church in Kaduna, in the northern part of Nigeria. He told me that although there is an explosion of church attendance in Nigeria, people are often dissatisfied with church. They look for somewhere where the Word is being taught because they are severely hungry. And they appreciate it when they hear thorough exegesis of the Bible itself. They are not gullible. What had he particularly learned from last year's seminar?

"I had often preached out of context. I learned the need to stay within the text while preaching it. I learned the discipline of preparing sermon notes seriously and I have realised through reading John Stott and others that theology doesn't have to be dry. You can give people good content without being boring."

As the Nigerian Langham Preaching movement grows and spreads, pray that it may become an open secret, and change a whole culture of preaching back to its biblical roots.

New Books for Ancient Believers

January 2008 saw the launch of the **Arabic Contemporary Theology**.

There have been Arab believers since before the followers of Jesus were even called Christians (a nickname that was invented in Syria). They were there on the day of Pentecost and the Christian church has continued in the Middle East throughout the past 2000 years. Some of the rich tradition of Arabic Christian theological writings from a thousand years ago are being rediscovered today. But a distinctively evangelical Arabic Christian voice has not been heard addressing its own theological concerns in today's world within significant book-size publications – until this year.

Beautifully produced as an A4 size textbook of 500 pages in two column Arabic, the **Arabic Contemporary Theology** is the fruit of a three year project by a group of 10 Arab Christian theologians in Egypt and Lebanon, some of whom are Langham Scholars. From clear biblical foundations, it tackles some of the sharp issues that Christians face especially in the Middle East. Issues such as the Old Testament concepts of covenant and land; the meaning of Jesus' identity as a Jew; Christianity and women; and salvation and other faiths.

Andrea Zaki Stephanous, Director of Dar El Thaqafa (the book's publisher) is a Langham Scholar who has driven the project from the beginning with significant

investment from Langham Partnership. He says, 'Our whole hope for a reference book like this is to create a debate, to open Arab Christians to the challenges

around them, and to strengthen the church's spiritual life.'

Another project that is helping and strengthening the Arab

Christian community is the **Arabic Global Christian Library**. Now consisting of six books, it will reach into seminaries as textbooks on basic Christian doctrines, but will also be distributed widely among pastors and preachers across the whole Middle East and Arabic speaking world.

The whole project represents exciting co-operation between all three Langham Programmes. It is of course a Literature project, but it is being driven forward by a Langham Scholar, and it will serve the cause of biblical preaching around the region.

Andrea concludes, 'Without the support of Langham Partnership and the help of God, these books would never have happened.'

"I am in debt to God first and Langham second"

Most Langham Scholars' eyes light up when they talk about their doctoral study supported by a Langham grant. But **Andrea Zaki Stephanous** positively sparkles as he describes the difference it has made in his life. Andrea did his PhD in Manchester, England, in the field of religion and politics. Chris Wright met him recently in his home country Egypt and asked him about it.

"My PhD programme absolutely transformed my life," Andrea began. "It was a paradigm shift for me. First it gave me a deep appreciation of the importance of education and adapting a proper scientific approach to problems. Secondly it equipped me with the skills I need in my role now. By the grace of God I serve in a top position in my church and country, and in that role I have to deal with intellectuals and officials. I would not know how to do so without the experience and skills of the PhD. Thirdly it has empowered me in my

job, as a professor, publisher, writer, speaker. I am invited both by the state and other organisations to give papers and presentations on a range of social and political issues as well as theological ones. Being academically equipped gives my church as a whole respect, in a culture where religious leaders are often despised as people of slogans only. Absolutely all my work as a leader in church, seminary, and society, has been transformed by the academic skills and challenges of the PhD work.

"And yet at the same time, as you go through the PhD you always affirm to yourself that you are a child in the world of learning. And even afterwards, I never feel that I am a 'Scholar' – when you know how much there is that you don't know! I don't feel worthy of that title. There is still a very long way to go."

So what exactly does Andrea do? Prepare to be astonished. He carries an amazing portfolio of responsibility. His other roles include: Professor at the Evangelical Theological Seminary of Cairo; TV Presenter; Chair of the Council for Service and Development for the Synod of the Nile; Vice President of the Protestant Council of Egypt and International Deputy Director for the Middle East for the Lausanne movement. "And yet," says Andrea, "I like to keep up my first love as

a researcher and writer. This is a crucial part of what I do. I set aside time weekly for that."

It would be hard to think of a better example of a rounded ministry of head,

heart and hands, than the work of Langham Scholar, Andrea Zaki, in Egypt.

"I would not be as I am now without God's grace and the support of Langham," he concluded. "That is from my heart."

A teacher with a missionary heart

That's the vision that Matthew Michael has for himself as he reaches the end of his first year on the PhD programme in Jos, Nigeria. He is the first Langham Scholar to be supported there. Matthew is being supported through the John Stott Ministries Scholar Programme (JSM being the member of Langham Partnership in the USA).



Matthew began his ministry as a missionary church planter with ECWA (Evangelical Church of West Africa) in the mid 1990s. He took his first degree in missiology, and his zeal is still very apparent. Even during his PhD studies, he engages in student ministry, taking some of his fellow students to the campus of the University of Jos and relating to village students there every Saturday and Sunday.

Matthew's other main passion is the Bible. He has been specialising in the Christological interpretation of the Old Testament, but with the particular goal of reaching the new generation of Africans with biblical teaching about Christ that is culturally rooted and relevant.

For four years before starting his doctoral studies, Matthew had already been teaching several courses at JETS, on Hebrew and Old Testament studies. He is also on the faculty of another ECWA seminary at Kagoro and will probably move to that faculty after his PhD. He is a highly valued member of the upcoming ECWA leadership, and finished both his BA and MA studies with top grades in all classes.

"I was so impressed with Matthew," writes Chris Wright, "and the way his enthusiasm for his studies just fizzed out of him as he talked about the topics he is researching and writing on. But then I discovered another reason for the joy in his voice and the sparkle in his eye. He got married just a couple of months ago, in December!" His new wife, Juliana, is doing a postgraduate degree in Law at the University of Jos.

Matthew is one of a growing number of Scholars that JSM-Langham is supporting to do their PhD in Majority World contexts.

Africa Preaching Consultation

The launch of a continental movement



'For the first time, it looks as though the vision of a Preaching movement is being realised', said Jonathan Lamb, following the Africa Preaching Consultation hosted in Nairobi, Kenya, in mid-December last year. Country coordinators of the Langham Preaching programmes from 13 countries met for 3 days of fellowship, discussion and prayer. They came from Zambia and Zimbabwe in the South to Ethiopia in the East, from Francophone countries in Central Africa to some of the largest as well as the poorest of countries in the continent.

To host the event, Langham Preaching joined forces with the Philip Project, a UK ministry that provides Bible training for Africans who are pursuing post-graduate study in the UK, so that they can return home better equipped to serve their churches. The Consultation gathered leaders of considerable stature and experience, and provided the opportunity to hear of new initiatives in training, growing evidence of indigenous local movements for pastors and lay preachers, and the ripple effect of the training as it impacts churches and communities. Muhindo Isesomo, the country coordinator in the Democratic Republic of Congo, explained how the 3-level Langham programme has been running for some 40 or 50 participants from across the DRC, but as a result of

The Africa Preaching movement is encouraging the exchange of trainers who cross borders to support each others programmes, and there are hopes for the development of regional networks and the planning for publishing in local languages.

In Tanzania over 300 pastors and lay preachers met in Mwanza and Morogoro for the next stage of training earlier this year. Of this number, 69 pastors

the establishment of small preachers clubs, 157 pastors and evangelists are already involved in the training ministry, with plans for extending the work during 2008.

The Africa

'graduated' on completion of the 3-level programme. MVIMUTA, the name of the Langham Preaching movement, also introduced a new track designed to equip local facilitators, who will in turn train pastors and lay preachers in their own towns and regions. Rev Frank Luvanda, country coordinator and Langham Preaching facilitator, hopes that MVIMUTA will reach preachers in the more remote regions of the country as a result of this new team of Tanzanian trainers. A similar track for local facilitators has just taken place in Uganda, where plans are underway for regionalised training in 8

areas of the country. Kenya too reaches a similar stage this August, with a level 2 and 3 event preceded by a track for local trainers. Country coordinator for Kenya, Mercy Ireri, continues to work tirelessly to encourage the development of a nationwide network of preachers' clubs.

And we hope for further pioneering this year: new initiatives are being planned for Rwanda, Liberia, Benin, Togo and Zambia. Step by step, the African preaching movement is making progress. By God's grace there is now the potential for a continent-wide network to encourage Biblical preaching.

And in sixth place, salvation...

We all know that salvation is the central message of the Bible, but in the Global Christian Library series, it is the sixth book to be published. The series is published in the west by IVP in the UK and the USA. The first five have already been translated and published in Arabic, and in January, Chris Wright was in Cairo for the launch of the sixth in the series, his own contribution, *Salvation Belongs to Our God*. In fact, the Arabic translation was launched in Egypt before the original English edition had reached the market! "Blessed be Egypt!" (Isaiah 19:25).

The Egyptian Christian publisher, Dar El Thaqaqa, under the energetic leadership of its manager, Dr Andrea Zaki Stephanous (a Langham Scholar), organised a public panel discussion to launch the new book. Chris Wright gave a lecture on the topic,

summarising the overall message of the book. There were two responses from a Lebanese and an Egyptian church leader, and then lively question and answer and discussion. The evening drew 190 people from a wide variety of Christian denominations and the book sold well.

Books for pastors in North Africa

It may look just like a pile of books on a table. But there is an exciting story behind it.

A Langham Partnership supporter in the UK read our news item about the translation and publication of the Global Christian Library series in Arabic. These are the first five books of a series on some key biblical doctrines. She knew of a Christian Arab pastor elsewhere in the Mediterranean who ministers by radio to Christians in several North African countries and who gathers some of their pastors and leaders to a safe external location for teaching conferences. She wondered if it might be possible for them to receive copies of these books and phoned the Langham office.

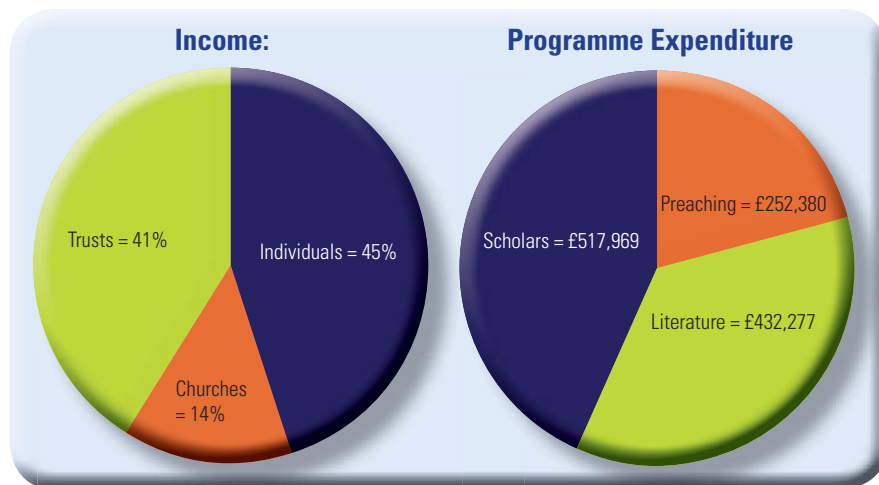
Langham Literature contacted the publisher in Egypt, who agreed to print an extra 500 copies of each book, virtually overnight, and despatch them immediately to the location where one of their conferences was about to be held.



Langham has paid for the production and delivery, and we have heard that the books have safely arrived already. Chris Wright was able to take the photo just before they left the warehouse in Egypt.

Christians live under very difficult conditions in that part of the world, and the small Christian groups that meet need good biblical teaching and pastoral help. Pray that these books will be a means to that goal.

Annual Report



Looking at our ministry from basic preaching training through literature delivery and creation and then scholarship development, 2006-07 has been a very encouraging year for us. An overview of each of our three programmes will give you an even better insight:

Langham Preaching

During the financial year 06/07 Langham Preaching has extended the programme to over 25 countries, with the launch of new country programmes in several parts of Africa, Asia, Europe and Latin America, and the sustained development of the three-level programme in many parts of the world. During the financial year over 1,000 pastors and lay preachers were involved in the training programme.

There has been growing evidence of the increased indigenisation of the programme, with regional networks established in several countries, and preaching clubs multiplying around the world. The facilitators' team has

increased to over 30 trainers from different continents, and our partnership with a range of organisations, churches, and seminaries has continued to increase.

We held a preaching consultation in Latin America, and subsequently appointed a Regional Facilitator for Latin America, taking responsibility for the oversight of Langham Preaching within that continent. A new 'training of trainers' programme has been launched, and during the year more effort has been given to identifying trainers in each continent, and providing helpful resources for the country coordinators. We have worked closely with Langham Literature in order to provide participants of the Langham Preaching

programme with practical books to assist them in their work.

We have sustained contact with many more countries, keen to establish a programme in the future: this has involved visits or correspondence with 60 countries in total. Much time has been given to the line-up of new projects, including those serving the South Asian countries, the Pacific Islands, China and the Russian Federation.

Langham Literature

In 2006-2007, our Literature Distribution Programme served 450 libraries in 62 countries, providing Library Grants. We also supplied two books to each of 15,583 former students - from 142 colleges in

37 different countries - who are now working in Christian ministries, through our Graduate Book Programme, providing books at three different levels (7,771 at Graduate Level, 5,701 at Diploma Level, and 2,111 at Certificate Level). Our Creative Programmes supported 18 local publishing projects (including EELAC grants) and initiated three regional commentary projects in Arabic, Kiswahili and Portuguese. Langham Writers completed three manuscripts and secured two projects for the new Hippo Press. The Editors' Training Programme had a successful launch, with two graduates so far, including one Kenyan who will lead the editing for the Kiswahili translation of the ABC.

Langham Scholars

A total of 23 scholars graduated spring 2007. A total 268 scholars comprises the global body of the Fellowship of Langham Scholars representing 67 countries with 171 graduated scholars who have returned to their home countries, and 97 current scholars. The PhD study was supported at universities and seminaries in the United States, United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, Hong Kong, and Switzerland. In addition, Langham Partnership International continues to expand its support of PhD programs in the Majority World including University of Natal and Stellenbosch, South Africa; Nairobi Evangelical Graduate School of Theology, Kenya; Acrofi-Christaller Memorial Centre, Accra Ghana; ISEDET,

Argentina; IBTS, Czech Republic, SAIACS, India. A regional meeting of the Fellowship of Langham Scholars was piloted in India for South Asia scholars aligned with the development of the Langham Partnership Regional Council. Greater networking and resourcing has taken place between scholars as Langham has begun to support global South-to-South faculty exchanges. Four Langham Partnership Regional Councils participated in the scholar selection process this year as Langham moves forward with the decentralisation of programme input and ownership. The scholars programme is managed by the International Programme Director for Scholars and five national Scholar Directors in the UK, USA, Hong Kong, Australia, and Canada.
